# **CALL TO ORDER**

The Chair called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and provided an Indigenous territorial acknowledgement.

The Chair conducted roundtable introductions of Committee members and attending Staff.

### **ADOPTION OF MINUTES**

# 1. Minutes of the Sports and Recreation Advisory Committee Meeting held on Wednesday, November 13, 2024

The Minutes of the Sports and Recreation Advisory Committee Meeting held on Wednesday, November 13, 2024 were approved.

# **NEW BUSINESS**

# 2. Committee Welcome

The Committee Clerk gave a presentation entitled "2025 Advisory Committee Orientation Session" and referred to slides contained in the Agenda package.

In response to questions from the Committee, the Committee Clerk noted the following:

- Committee members are required to attend regularly scheduled meetings and must notify the Committee Clerk as soon as possible in advance of the meeting to confirm their attendance or communicate their regrets.
- Committee members are now required to request hardcopy agenda packages in their response to attending the meeting.

# 3. Review and Adoption of the 2025 Sports and Recreation Advisory Committee Work Plan

The Director Major Capital Projects provided introductory comments relative to the 2025 Sports and Recreation Advisory Committee Draft Work Plan.

Discussion ensued relative to the following:

- The City's partnership with Planet Ice scheduled to end in late-August and the potential for the item to be discussed under the Major Facilities Roadmap Work Plan item.
- The Coquitlam Sports Hall of Fame Update being scheduled for the April 9, 2025 Meeting by Committee member Cydney Smythies.

# COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

That Council approve the 2025 Sports and Recreation Advisory Committee Work Plan.

# 4. Sports Field Strategy Update

The Manager Community Partnerships and Policy and Manager Sport Services gave a presentation entitled "Draft Coquitlam Sports Field Strategy (2025-2035)" and referred to slides contained in the amended Agenda package.

Discussion ensued relative to the following:

- The project timeline and methods of communicating the Draft Sports Field Strategy to user groups.
- The potential for user fee implementation for artificial turf fields to occur via a gradual fee structure to ensure equity across sport groups and support a continued diversity of sports and activities.
- The possibility of a fee structure that supports the continuation of female participation in sport and prevents youth from dropping out of sports due to financial constraints.
- The definition of "long term" in relation to P3 and Regional Collaboration in the Draft Sports Field Strategy Plan.
- Concern over the planned growth in sports field inventory scheduled for the next 10 years as it is currently difficult for sports organizations to meet their Standards of Play with the current inventory.
- Concerns about the age of the data used in the creation of the Draft Sports Field Strategy Plan and disappointment in the consultation process prior to the Draft Strategy going before Council.
- Desire to see a specified implementation plan relating to the scheduled maintenance and repairs of existing field inventory, the associated costs, and how those costs fit into the anticipated funding gap.
- The success of the current allocation process and the positive collaboration of sports groups in the City of the Coquitlam.
- The budget for field maintenance not appearing to substantially grow or consider inflation from 2006 to 2025.
- The importance of considering the growth of new sports and required facilities and how that may impact funding for other sports facilities in the city.
- The Draft Strategy being a guiding document and that engagement can still occur as the planning process continues.

The Manager Sport Services and the Manager Community Partnerships and Policy left the meeting at this point and did not return - 8:34 p.m.

# 5. Committee Members' Roundtable / Emerging Accessibility Issues

The Chair invited Committee members to share emerging sports and recreation issues and events in their communities.

Discussion ensued relative to the following:

- The Coquitlam Crunch Trail, including its possible extension, new trail system creation, and the recreational and active transportation functions it serves.
- The nomination period for the Coquitlam Sports Hall of Fame "Hall of Fame" and the "Wall of Fame" being open until March 1, 2025.
- Potential impacts to the bird nesting season related to the construction at the Northeast Community Centre.
- The progress of construction of recreation facilities at new school sites planned for the Burke Mountain community.
- The City's partnership with Planet Ice ending in August and the potential impacts to ice arena facility availability.
- Desire to update the Poirier Forum to include HVAC.
- The Coquitlam Curling Association/Curl BC's continued interest in a Curling of Excellence facility.
- The Coquitlam Indoor Athletics Association's continued goal to honour Les Wingrove.
- Indoor Recreation Strategy updates.
- The expected opening date of Mundy Park Pool.
- Sustained interest in an ice arena being built in the Northeast Community Centre.
- Continued growth in pickleball in Coquitlam and the impacts caused by a lack of facilities.
- Opportunity to use unconventional facilities for sports and recreational activities, such as the former Safeway location at Lougheed Mall being converted into an indoor pickleball facility.
- Opportunity for temporary disc golf courses in underutilized recreation spaces such as Eagle Mountain for tournaments.
- The potential impacts parking fees at neighbouring municipalities' recreational spaces may have on access to recreational activities.
- Coquitlam Tennis Centre now being the only local indoor tennis facility and how facility bookings are allocated for public use.
- Coquitlam Tennis Centre's location being near Metro Vancouver's Coquitlam Water Main Project construction and the potential physical damage to the court surfaces that could eventually lead to safety issues.

April 2025

### Activities for 2024:

- Induction Ceremony held on June 11, 2024
  - Hall of Fame honoured two outstanding athletes and two remarkable builders from baseball, field hockey, softball and broadcasting.
  - For the calendar year of 2023 the Wall of Fame honoured 12 inspiring athletes, two
    outstanding coaches, and a highly successful team in a variety of sports, including: field
    hockey, soccer, track and field, golf, lacrosse, swimming, ice hockey, BMX racing, and disc
    golf.
- We worked with PS Media to offer both a video and in-person program for the event.
- The video of the induction ceremony will be posted on our website.
- We continue to partner with city staff continuing to work collaboratively and respectfully with all levels of city staff.
- We are hopeful that our yearly financial allotment soon.
- Expanded number of board members, recruiting new members, and replacing retired members
- Created a display of Coquitlam Metro Ford Inductees and had a booth for their 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary event September 2024. Display was moved to the Poirier Sport and Rec Complex.
- Hosted a Pub Night in May 2024 with great success.
- Artifacts Project continues to move forward with 90% of inductees catalogued
  - New Board member is working on updating the website with information and pictures of all inductees with easier search paths.
- Coquitlam Heritage Society continues to have wonderful sporting displays in the Hall of Fame.
- We have received the go-ahead from the Kwikwetlem First Nation to work on an Indigenous
  Lacrosse Display. Their involvement may evolve during the process, and we have left that up to the
  band. We met with city staff to review possibilities and are waiting to hear back before we move
  forward.


### Looking to 2025:





# Training and Certificate

- Leadership Development: Create pathways for students to become certified coaches, referees, and team organizers, enhancing their career opportunities within handball.

# Timeline

Year 1:

### Laying the Foundation

- Elementary and Secondary Schools: Introduce handball in PE classes and set up afterschool handball clubs.
- Colleges and Universities: Form partnerships to establish handball clubs and intramural leagues.
- Community Engagement: Begin offering introductory handball sessions at community centers and recruit local clubs to add handball as an activity.
- Evaluation Metrics: Track the number of schools, colleges, and community centers participating; gather feedback from students and staff.

Year 2:

# Expanding Participation and Building Infrastructure

- Inter-School Leagues: Launch inter-school and inter-college handball leagues to promote competitive play.
- Community Programs: Expand regular handball sessions at community centers and establish youth leagues.
- Coaching Certification: Start training and certifying PE teachers, coaches, and referees to support the growing demand.
- Evaluation Metrics: Measure participation rates in leagues and community programs; assess the number of trained coaches and referees.

Year 3

### Talent Development and Increased Visibility

- Talent Identification: Identify promising players through school and community leagues and invite them to join talent development programs.
- Elite Training Camps: Organize regional training camps for identified talent, focusing on skill development and fitness.
- Promotion and Awareness: Run social media campaigns and partner with local media to cover key handball events.
- Evaluation Metrics: Track the number of players in talent programs; measure social media engagement and media coverage.

Year 4:

### Institutionalization and Elite Development

- Official Sport Recognition: Work with educational boards and community centers to officially recognize handball as a core sport.
- Regular Tournaments: Establish annual tournaments for schools, colleges, and community clubs.
- National Representation: Prepare elite players for participation in provincial and national competitions.
- Evaluation Metrics: Count the number of institutions officially recognizing handball; measure tournament participation and player selection for provincial/national teams.
