Property Taxes Due Next Week

Residential and commercial property owners have a few more days to pay property taxes and avoid penalty before the July 4 deadline. Funding close to half of Coquitlam's total budget, tax revenue pays for essential services that improve the quality of life for Coquitlam residents such as police protection, fire/rescue response, road maintenance, recreation, culture services programs and events, parks and trails, and more. Our Reconciliation Journey

kʷikʷəłəm Day July 1

kʷikʷəłəm First Nation have a big milestone to celebrate on July 1, as they mark two years since their membership ratified their Land Code. In recognition of this significant event, the kʷikʷəłəm have reclaimed July 1 as Swelk'xwtn (swale-muh-welk-teh-muk), which means "This is our land!" The passing of their Land Code enshrines the laws they have created regarding the protection, development, use, possession and management of their reserve lands and natural resources. This allows the Nation to reclaim their right to honour their responsibility to preserve, protect and enhance kʷikʷəłəm land, waters, resources, heritage, language and culture. Indigenous Cultural Safety in Emergency Management

The City of Coquitlam and kʷikʷəłəm (Kwikwetlem) First Nation have taken an important step in improving Indigenous cultural safety in local emergency management as they confirm the appointment of Desiree Baker to lead a training program for City staff.

The implementation of an Indigenous Cultural Safety and Humility Training program for the City's emergency management teams builds on the Joint Mitigation Flood Initiative application in September 2022 (pending approval) to secure funding towards dike improvements and flood-prevention measures along the Coquitlam and Fraser rivers.

Desiree Baker, of the 'Namgis First Nation, has been selected by a steering committee comprised of representatives of both the City and the kʷikʷəłəm First Nation to develop and deliver training that fosters inclusivity and deepens City staff's understanding of the unique needs and perspectives of Indigenous Peoples with a focus on emergency management situations. Looking Out for Our Environment

Be Mindful of Fire Safety While Doing Home Renos

Residents planning home renovations this summer can minimize the risk and impact of fires by following recommended safety guidelines. Using fire resistant-rated construction materials reduces the risk of fire and can act as a fire break, reducing a fire's spread and extending the amount of time it takes for a home to ignite and burn. Other recommendations include:

- Ensuring adequate fire protection during construction including hot-works safety practices during welding, roofing and plumbing installations. Construction fire safety plans are required.
- Using fire resistant-rated roof materials such as concrete tile, slate, metal and terra-cotta.
- Building decks with fire-resistant materials covered and solid surfaces.
- Ensuring outdoor structures have at least nine metres separation from the house or other structures.
- Relocating flammable debris such as building materials, solvents and lumber at least 10 metres away from the home.
- Not littering cigarette butts or do any outdoor burning.

All homeowners should consult registered covenants on the use of materials and design approaches prior to building construction. For more information, visit coquitlam.ca/InterfaceFire.
