

Creating a Vibrant Downtown Core

Concentrating a mix of jobs, housing, shops, dining and entertainment near SkyTrain will create a vibrant and active downtown for residents, workers and visitors.



- Transform existing mall sites near SkyTrain into a new Commercial Downtown Core.
- > Include a mix of residential towers, offices, shops, dining, entertainment and public amenities.
- > Create an Entertainment District along Northern Avenue and The High Street.
- > Support tourism and the business community with new hotel and conference space that is accessible by vehicle and transit.























Creating a Vibrant Downtown Core

The design of public spaces, and the buildings that frame them, is essential for creating a vibrant downtown.

- > Pedestrian-friendly commercial streets will have storefronts that open directly onto the sidewalk.
- > Landmark gateway features will mark entrances into City Centre at strategic locations.
- > Streets, parks, plazas and squares will be visually interesting, inviting, safe, functional and unique.










Three Precincts will serve as unique destinations and focal points of activity.

- > Focused around or near SkyTrain stations
- > A mix of office, residential towers, shopping, entertainment and civic amenities
- > Major entry plazas
- > Landmark architecture and distinctive public art
















Establishing a Strong Employment Base

A strong employment base is key to a successful downtown. The draft Plan supports job growth by providing opportunities for businesses to grow and thrive.



- > Double the amount of commercial space that is required as part of new developments in the Commercial Downtown Core.
- > Create Office Business Districts around Lincoln and Coquitlam Central SkyTrain stations.
- > Increase Business Enterprise opportunities in areas along Barnet Highway and Christmas Way.

























Building a Family-Friendly Downtown

An attractive downtown supports residents at all stages of life with a range of housing choices and services that meet their needs.

- > Direct the majority of new housing to the downtown core and maintain existing homes in surrounding neighbourhoods.
- > Secure a centrally-located new elementary school site in the downtown core.
- Establish partnerships for new and expanded services, including affordable housing, child care, and seniors housing and care.
- > Ensure streets, walkways, open spaces, and public facilities are universally accessible, benefitting people of all ages and abilities.
- > Prioritize housing to meet the needs of various households:
 - 3+ bedroom units
- Purpose-built rental
- Seniors housing
- Below-market & non market rental
- Student housing
- Accessible units





















Enhancing Recreation and Cultural Services

New and upgraded parks and open spaces, recreation facilities, and cultural amenities are essential to making City Centre a great place to live.



- > New recreational and cultural amenities will serve the growing community in the downtown core.
- > New parks will be built in locations which complement the existing park network and which provide access to residents within a 5 minute walk.
























Enhancing Recreation and Cultural Services

To provide public spaces for socializing, gathering, exploration and rest, a series of publicly-accessible open spaces are envisioned to extend throughout City Centre. **Examples include:**



Gateways:

Located at entry points to Coquitlam and the Commercial Downtown Core to contribute to a sense of identity and announce arrival.



Plazas:

> Provide opportunities for socialization, exploration and special events (e.g., farmers market, performances, and outdoor exercise classes).




Squares:

Located to maximize access to sunlight and provide opportunities for gathering, socializing and rest (e.g., neighbourhood parks and playgrounds, patio seating, and dog parks).



Parkettes:

Located mid-block along commercial streets to break up the streetscape by providing opportunities for socialization, rest, and support for adjacent businesses (outdoor displays and patio seating).



Gardens:

> Provide opportunities for rest and reflection through additional landscaping and public amenities (e.g., food garden, rain garden, or quiet reflection park).




Walkways:

Located mid-block to break up larger blocks and provide pedestrians and cyclists access and movement throughout City Centre.








Integrating and Connecting Downtown

The draft Plan balances the needs of vehicle traffic with improvements to make City Centre more walkable and bicycle-friendly, while taking advantage of access to SkyTrain.



- > New streets and a finer grid street network will improve movement for vehicles, pedestrians and cyclists throughout City Centre.
- > Shorter block lengths will reduce travel distances between destinations.
- > Pedestrian-friendly streets will improve safety and help create an enjoyable and healthy environment for walking and cycling.






















Integrating and Connecting Downtown

New and improved sidewalks and pathways will help to make walking and cycling safer and more enjoyable.



- > A network of sidewalks and pathways will connect business areas with neighbourhoods, schools, cultural and recreation facilities and natural areas.
- > Sidewalks and pathways will also serve as links between parks, creating an interconnected park system.
